KALAMA TO DISTRIBUTE ARPA/CSLFRF FUNDS

Under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) assistance program was established. Kalama is expected to receive approximately \$781,000 under the plan,



most of which has been allocated to sewer system improvements in an effort to lower future rate increases. The City Council has allocated a portion of the funding to be distributed out to the Community to help those residents and business owners who were affected by the pandemic and are still struggling. The application period is now open until February 28, 2022. DEVELOPMENT IN KALAMA – PROPERTY RIGHTS AND CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

The recent development application for the Lofts at Kalama has created a lot of interest and produced a lot of questions on how land use decisions are made

on such applications. For various land use applications, the property owner/applicant will submit a request for a project to the City often after meeting with city staff for a "pre-application conference" where they have submitted ideas and received information on what the Kalama Municipal code and other regulatory requirements are to develop their property. The application may include environmental reports, geo-tech studies, traffic studies and preliminary design drawings depending on the type of development. These are reviewed by city staff and the City's engineering and



planning consultants for Kalama Municipal code and state regulartory compliance to ensure specifications are adhered too. Once the application has been reviewed, the application is referred to either the Planning Commission or to a Hearings Examiner for review at a public hearing. The notice of the public

hearing is mailed to property owners within 300 feet of the property, posted on site, posted at Post Office and other locations around Kalama, on the City website and Facebook pages, as well as publishing a legal notice in Longview Daily News. The hearing is held as noticed as an "open record hearing" where the applicant presents the

proposal, the city staff reports on compliance of the application and the public has the opportunity to comment or testify for the record. The staff report includes how the proposal complies with the City's municipal code, standards, and needs including review of the comprehensive plan, as well as state regulations, and recommending conditions of approval based on the findings included in the report. The hearing may be continued to a future date for further input. Once closed, the Planning Commission or Hearings Examiner will review all the evidence included in the record to make a determination either as the final decision or as recommendations to the City Council for the final decision.

If the application goes to the City Council, they will review the recommendations and all evidence included in the record at a public meeting, where no new testimony (something that wasn't presented in the hearings) can be taken. The Council must base the decision on the rules of law, using the evidence before them and recommendations presented in making their decision. Ensuring the City doesn't infringe on a property owner's rights to develop their property while meeting the needs of the city and it's citizens can be difficult and requires adherence to rules and laws which may not always be in accordance with public opinion.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING CITY COUNCIL PUTS IT ON HOLD



At the City Council public hearing on January 20, 2022, the Council made the decision to put the proposal for curbside recycling on hold for now. Members of the public sent comments and completed an unscientific survey with some in support and some non-supportive. While debate could go on, the Council felt the citizen's concerns showed enough non-support

that they should look at other options to address the recycling needs of the City. The City will be looking into having the drop off sites picked up more often, a location for the disposal of yard debris, and if it would be possible to add glass and/or plastic back at the drop off locations. The Council may decide to form a committee to review and bring a future proposal back for consideration. A few frequently asked questions are answered below.

Why can't the service be voluntary instead of mandatory?


There are costs associated with the service which include Waste Control's purchase of the carts being provided and hiring personnel for driving the routes. For efficiency in designing the routes it is necessary to include all homes, and in the effort to provide affordability the costs spread out to all, lowers the cost per household. As with all businesses, there needs to be a bit of profitability for the services offered.

What is the proposed actual cost and does it include taxes?

The proposed cost of just curbside recycling (includes, paper, cardboard, tin/aluminum, and plastics) was \$5.88. The State garbage tax is not applicable to recycling services. The City utility tax could be applied, but Council had indicated they would not assess the tax on the recycling services.

Why don't they have drop off locations for plastics?

Issues with plastics are many as are issues for drop off locations. Only certain types of plastics are eligible for recycling which requires educating customers under a curbside program or self-education. Waste Control is only able to take types 1 and 2 plastics currently. Drop off locations are unmonitored, so contamination is more common, which results in some of the "recycles" becoming garbage going to the landfill.



LOW INCOME DISCOUNT AVAILABLE

Beginning in January 2022, the income limits to qualify for Kalama's low-income discount are changing. If your household size meets the income levels listed in the table, you may be eligible for a discount on your Kalama utility bill. The amount of the discount is also increasing in January for a total reduction of \$25.30 per month for a water/sewer/stormwater customer.
